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- Stopping bleeding. Apply pressure to the wound to stop bleeding. If the bleeding is severe, you may need to use a tourniquet.
- Treating burns. Cool the burn with water. Do not apply ice or butter to the burn.
- Treating fractures. Immobilize the fracture with a splint. Do not try to set the bone yourself.
- Treating sprains and strains. Apply ice to the injured area. Rest the injured area and elevate it above your heart.
- Treating head injuries. Keep the victim still and calm. Do not give them any food or drink.


In most cases, you will need to call for help after you have provided first aid care. This is especially important if the victim is seriously injured. When you call for help, be sure to provide the following information:

- The nature of the injury.
- The victim's condition.

Your name and contact information.

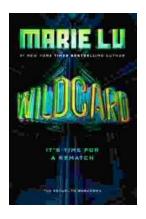

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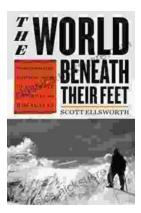
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
